Puffins and cormorants star on new webcams

While the seabird islands of the Maine Coastal Islands National Wildlife Refuge are closed to visitors during the nesting season (April 1 through August 31), that doesn't mean you have to miss the seabird action. With permission from the Refuge, the National Audubon Society has set up webcams on Seal Island that give you close-up views of nesting seabirds in their Refuge home—without ever leaving your computer or smartphone. Be a (vicarious) seabird researcher

Each year, your donations to FOMCI help support a dedicated crew of summer research interns who live and work on the refuge's seabird nesting islands. This summer, the refuge is lucky to have 10 interns on four islands: Petit Manan (Jill Tengeres, Morgan O'Connor, Shelby Fortier, James Welch), Eastern Brothers Island (Nathan Jaenecke, Dawson Carter), Ship Island (Meredith Miles, Kelby Leary) and Metinic Island (Mark Baran, Helen Manning).

You can get a first-hand look at the interns' life and work on these islands—and see some really fascinating photos—by checking in regularly with their <u>blog</u>, "**Summer with the Seabirds**." From rounding up snakes, to herding sheep, to counting birds, nests, eggs and chicks, their entertaining posts will give you a glimpse of what it's like to live among the birds and seals on an island off the Maine coast.

Our Refuge has mainland trails too!

The Maine Coastal Islands National Wildlife Refuge is known for its islands that protect nesting seabirds in the Gulf of Maine. But did you know that the Refuge offers places you can visit for outdoor fun on the mainland? June is Great Outdoors Month, and a good time to put on your hiking boots and explore one of refuge's <u>trails</u>. It's a great way to experience Maine's own Great Outdoors—without the crowds.

The **Corea Heath Trail in Gouldsboro** is easy, short (just 0.4 miles) and wheelchair accessible. Also in Gouldsboro is the moderately difficult **Salt Marsh Trail**, which winds for 1.6 miles through rolling conifer forest and offers two observation platforms providing views of the marsh. Be on the lookout for the bald eagles that nest nearby, and for waterfowl and shorebirds in the marsh.

The moderately difficult **Birch Point Trail on Petit Manan** winds 4.2 miles through salt-marsh habitat and offers excellent wildlife viewing and observation points along Petit Manan Point. The easy loop of the 1.2-mile **Hollingsworth Trail** provides access to the rocky shoreline of Petit Manan Point and offers a self-guided nature tour highlighting the wildlife and coastline of the Refuge.
